

Dear All,

Can anyone fail to be overwhelmed by the promise and glory of Spring? The climate may be uncertain: as I write this in March it's quite



bright and warm, but I'm aware of course that by the time you read this in April we might have reverted to some unseasonably extreme weather. Or it might still be quite nice, perhaps even warmer. But either way the buds are out, daffodils on their way, the air filled with birdsong at all hours, and the lambs being born. For me as a Christian, the seasons are in harmony with the Creator God who ordained that it should be so. It is no accident that Jesus, that holy man whose life was filled with love, died and rose again in the Springtime of the year, during a Jewish Spring festival of new life and liberation.

How can I speak with such confidence? Surely, it's all a matter of struggling faith and a dim historical record. But for two hundred years or more people have battered at the New Testament accounts of Jesus' life, death and resurrection in an attempt to discredit them, and though understood in a variety of ways by different Christians, the fundamental witness still comes out as perfectly credible, carefully written down well within the lifetimes of

the people involved in the actual events. I sometimes get a little tired of having to defend this belief against the supposition that it's just a whacky superstition. The whole thing, surprising and wonderful as it is, makes a certain kind of sense to me.

Does this mean I can then despise people with different beliefs? Not a bit of it. I'm happy to join hands with pagans or those with no particular beliefs about anything in celebrating the wonders of new life, warmth, and the growth of all that sustains us and enhances our appreciation of the beauty around us.

However, I would want to share with all these people the possibility of something more. For otherwise, we just have to face the fact that all the wonderful cycles of nature will end with the triumph of darkness and death, as our earthly lives end in extinction, or until ultimately the sun itself goes out. As truth and love too are under threat in these increasingly dark times, we might have reason also to fear the ultimate triumph of evil. But in the resurrection of a loving saviour, who called himself the way, the truth and the life, we are given the invitation to hope for the final overwhelming of darkness by his glorious light.

I wish you all a very happy Easter.

Praying for our benefice

Prayer is crucial for everything we do; so most months we meet to pray for the life of our villages and our churches. Everyone is welcome to come and share this time – it doesn't matter if you've not prayed with others before, and if you're not confident in praying aloud no one is going to make you do so! God hears silent prayers as well as those that are spoken out loud.

Having said that, there will be no meeting in April because of the Lent study series! In May we will meet on the second Saturday, 10th May, at 9.30 at the Rectory.

Fountains PCC need a secretary!

The parish of Fountains, which covers the churches in Aldfield, Sawley and Winksley, needs a secretary for the Church Council.

This role is unpaid and requires little time commitment, but is essential. It covers things like sending agendas and taking minutes for the council meetings every 3 or 4 months; collating and sending some information online to the diocese; and forwarding occasional emails with information to the members of the council.

The secretary does not have to be a member of the PCC or even a church member but needs to be at home on a computer and willing to give up a little time and the occasional evening for the meetings. Experienced people will be able to give all the guidance needed.

If you think you may be able to help us, please contact Ian Kitchen or one of the churchwardens for the parish.

Electoral rolls – all change!

Any baptised person who lives in a parish or who attends a church regularly is entitled to be on the Electoral Roll for that church and to have a say in various aspects of church life. (This is completely different from the Register of Electors for local and national government elections, by the way.) Every few years we have to scrap the existing Electoral Roll and compile a new one, and this is one of those years.

We'll be trying to get in touch with everyone who has been on the old rolls, but others who qualify are very welcome to join the new roll – there are forms in the churches together with more details and information on where to return the form to.

Keyboard skills

We're not thinking about computers but pianos and organs. Do you play? Might you be willing to join the list of those who play our hymns on a Sunday, at any of the churches? You don't need to be a professional, and pianists can make a perfectly good sound on the organ even if the pedals are

a complete mystery (just ignore them!). We do need more people to come and join in this important role, so please get in touch with Ian or Andrew if you are at all interested – help and guidance from our existing players will be arranged.

Looking ahead

We will be having a Day of Prayer on Tuesday 13th May, to give thanks and to look ahead with a particular view to what happens during the vacancy once lan retires. Full details of venue and timing will be in next month's magazine. The day will be designed so that anyone can drop in at any stage and stay for as much or as little as desired. Please note it in your diary now.

'Elizabeth is Missing' by Emma Healey, such an unassuming title hiding a book of such depth. There was certainly nothing missing from the quality of the writing or the storyline. The main character, Maud, is suffering memory loss and cannot remember what has happened to her friend Elizabeth. She is desperately trying to find her but keeps forgetting what she has already done in order to do this. The reader is led to believe this is the main storyline but there is an unexpected twist as another story becomes apparent and one which Maud has greater memories of as she delves into her past. The two stories are interwoven so cleverly and give the

book a sense of mystery and intrigue. Healey's way of describing how thoughts slip away from people with dementia and the difficulty to separate time is very accurate and she portrays effectively the struggle Maud has just to cope with everyday life. The writing is detailed with interesting, believable characters and evokes many emotions.

As a group all bar one (who didn't like the first person narration) wholly enjoyed this book. Most found it slow at the beginning but were soon hooked. It brought out lots of emotions and some found it challenging when having to confront the fear of memory loss and this was very pertinent given the age of most members being closer to Maud. We had a lively discussion around this topic. Given this was Healey's debut novel it was agreed by all that it was a great success.

Next month we are reading 'The Red Notebook' by Antoine Laurain.

Girlguiding Fountains


All our units have continued to grow in numbers and we are pleased to welcome some young volunteers who are doing their D of E Award. The guides are also welcoming a Young Leader, who came through the Fountains units.

This term the Rainbows have been developing their skills in planning a healthy plate and making purchases within a budget. Games have looked at what is fun and fair, improving opportunities to be inclusive. They have enjoyed celebrating Thinking Day and tasting their pancakes, which were served with a scrumptious choice of fillings. At last, it has been sufficiently light to take a wander round the village and look at its features.

The highlight for the Brownies has been the trip to Lime Tree Farm — a perfect night to see Jupiter, Saturn and Mars as well as many constellations through the telescopes. In the planetarium they travelled to Mars and along the dry riverbed to discover it was longer than the US is wide. Pancakes also featured and the girls have looked at food groups before increasing fruit and vegetable intake with smoothies. The Brownies explored different ways to develop confidence, especially when public speaking or faced with a tricky situation.

The Guides have been completing the Take Action- Influence section, building on the girls' values and passions. They have participated in a flash mob in the unit to showcase plastic pollution, written letters to convince others to support their charity projects and learned the history of votes for women and the suffragettes. They have also practised shadow puppetry and developed their creative ideas through dance, short dramas and architecture.

Nearly £130,000 raised in community shares towards purchase of Henry Jenkins

Supporters of the Henry Jenkins Community Pub group have deposited £129,500 in share purchases over the past month - more than half the £250k target. The group started calling in share pledges from nearly 180 residents last month as part of its latest strategy to buy and refurbish the Jenks as a community-owned pub, bistro and coffee shop. Most investors are local but some are from people with local connections living in other parts of England and Ireland. One recent investor is leading gin distiller Masons of Yorkshire, Leeming Bar.

Group chair Richard Sadler says: "We're delighted to have had this fantastic response in such a short time. It confirms the depth and breadth of support we have in the village, means we're taken more seriously as a business and it'll put us in prime position for future match grant funding."

The group is now encouraging more supporters to buy shares and plans a series of trips to established community-owned pubs to learn more about what a revamped Henry Jenkins might offer. This follows a packed public meeting at the Mechanics in November attended by ward councillor Felicity Cunliffe-Lister and representatives of four community-owned pubs. Among speakers was CAMRA's community pub specialist, Paul Ainsworth. He said there were now 180 community-owned pubs nationally including 21 in Yorkshire and not a single one had failed. He said many co-existed happily alongside other pubs - and he saw no reason why the Henry Jenkins shouldn't thrive again in a village like Kirkby.

Sawley Moor Lane Diary

Marching towards April

A little sunshine warmed the soil in the field to the east of us and while standing at the kitchen sink, as I do, I notice a large mob of approximately 400 starlings on the ground feeding. At some instinctive signal they all rose about 3 foot off the surface together and moved to another area. This way, like some kind of black duvet, they covered the whole area of the field section by random section, as if lifted and gently shaken they settled once more on their grassy bed! After about ten minutes another flock half the numbers joined them, settled, then again they all rose and gave a mini murmuration folding and twisting in the air until settling on a shared direction they flew off towards Fountains Abbey.

A few days later another welcome burst of sunshine persuaded all the tear shaped snowdrop flowers in the garden to change to spring parasols announcing to all suitable insects that they were open for business!

The purple and white crocuses on the verge of the village green have given us one of their better displays and the roadside daffodils are shaping up nicely to change the colour palette again.

In the middle of a field left to permanent grass since the second world war, when it was used for growing cereals as part of the war effort, there has been a little strip of unusual daffodils which have survived harrowing, rolling, cattle and haytime/sillaging for over fifty years. They are a type with a split corona, that is have a cluster of petals within the trumpet or no trumpet at all. The only other place I've noticed them is by the path from the abbey towards tent hill at Fountains. If you have any like this, please get in touch, I'd love to know what they are. Perhaps their agricultural treatment has meant they have not cross pollinated and so remain an old variety.

To finish and welcome April – a stanza from W.H.Davies and a couplet from Shakespeare:

When April scatters coins of primrose gold Among the copper leaves in thickets old, And singing skylarks from the meadows rise, To twinkle like black stars in sunny skies ... When proud-pied April, dressed in all his trim, Hath put a spirit of youth in everything.

P.S. The pestral mentioned in last month's Fountain was of course the pesky kestrel as the barn owl names it. The owls have had better hunting this month and twice we have seen one swoop down, settle, mantle and then fly off to a fence post with vole in claw, to swallow it whole, gulp it down with a satisfied smile on its beak.

some leafleting around the local villages in the next few weeks. Below are details of two of their services which may be of interest to readers.


Here to HELP

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
